SITUATION REPORT

Event:Flash FloodingSit Rep No:02Date:19th March, 2024

Period: 18th – 19th March, 2024

This situation report released by the National Disaster Risk Management Office (NEMO) is to inform operational partners on the current situation of the prolonged heavy rainfall ($15^{th} - 18^{th}$ March, 2024) and flash flooding in Tongatapu.

Highlights

- One Evacuation centre in Pili activated to house one family
- Two families reported evacuating to NEOC (17/03/2024)
- TRCS and NDRMO promptly responded to displaced family at Pili with NFIs and water
- TRCS distributed tarps to affected homes
- NDRMO, TFES and Tonga Police began water pumping operations
- NEOC received 29 contacts 17 18th March, 2024
- 'Eua reported damages to infrastructure; MOI responded
- Verifying households under the Tapanekale program living in affected areas
- Joined awareness programs by MEIDECC, TRCS, MOH, MET
- MOI clears fallen trees blocking public roads



A. Background

An active trough from a low pressure system lies over the Group. Associated cluds, heavy occasional rain, thunderstorms and strong gutsy winds will affect Vava'u, Ha'apai, Tongatapu and 'Eua groups today, *Weather Bulletin Issued at 6:00am Sunday 17th March, 2024.*. The prolonged heavy rainfall lead flooding in low lying communities in Tongatapu.

Initial Rapid Situation Assessment conducted at 1:00am – 3:00am Sunday, 17th March, 2024 showed that rising waters have reached the foundation level of residential homes at low lying villages. Two inter-agency teams were deployed at 9:00am to provide a second initial rapid situation assessment overview

B. Current situation

1. Fua'amotu Forecasting Centre – Tonga Meteorological Services



2.	Nomuka	- From 7pm Wednesday to 7pm Thursday = Expect 40-50mm
		- From 10pm Friday to 7pm Sunday = Expect 150-180mm
3.	Lifuka	 From 7pm Wednesday to 7pm Thursday = Expect 60-85m
		- From 10pm Friday to 7pm Sunday = Expect 40-60m
4.	Neiafu	- From 7pm Wednesday to 7pm Thursday = Expect 40-60mm


• Next 10 days accumulated rainfall forecast

Tongatapu, 'Eua and Ha'apai will experience will experience more than 100mm of rainfall accumulated over the next 10 days



2. National Emergency Operation Centre (NEOC)

- The NEOC is still in operation receiving contacts, verifying information and coordinating response.
- Contacts to EOC were made via, telephone calls, emails and social media
- The NEOC received 29 contacts.
- 'Eua have submitted report via email 18/3/2024
- Tungua Island reported damaged to TRCS; NEOC is verifying the information received.



2.2 'Eua Island

- Reported only impacts to roads; agricultural sector welcomes rain.
- Auxiliary bridge beside the Fangumalingi bridge was damaged; Ministry of Infrastructure have managed to fixed the bridge for temporary use; *OIC MEIDECC* report & Local Governance Report 19/3/2024
- Newly paved roads in 'Ohonua affected by heavy runoff, piling gravels along the the runoff section by the road and at low lying areas.





2.3 Ha'apai Island

- Tungua Island Report from Tonga Red Cross Society is under is verification as Town Officer is in Lifuka
- Felemea reported that homes were not inundated; however 2 small fishing boats were damaged by gale winds

3. Displaced Households

3.1 Evacuation centre

- Only 1 evacuation centre was activated at Pili to house family of six whose home were inundated.
- Tonga Police assisted with the tracking of the location of the family to be evacuated as the number provided to NEOC remained unanswered after initial call for assistance
- TRCS and NDRMO responded providing evacuated family with food and Non-Food Items.
- As of 18/3/2024 the evacuated family were still at the evacuation centre. The family indicated they will return home on Tuesday (19/3/2024) if fine weather remains and flood water have receeded.



3.2 Displaced households ot in evacuation centres

<u>3.2.1 Pea</u>

- Two households at Pea evacuated to relatives at Fasi and Folaha, *Local Governance Report 19/3/2-24*
- One household in Pea evacuated to relatives at Te'ekiu, NEOC Report
- One household in Pea moved to adjacent building on a higher elevation, *Local Governance Report 19/3/2-24*

4. Response

4.1 Water Pumping Operation

- There were five identified areas for water pumping operation; Hala'ovave ('Atenisi), 'Isileli, Fasi-Moe-Afi (Behind British High Commisioners Residence), Ma'ufanga and Popua
- Joint Water Pumping Operation Teams from NDRMO, TFES and Tonga Police commenced work at Hala'ovave and the Fasimoeafi.
- Advisory on radio and NDRMO Social about road closure of operation.
- Operation at Fasimoeafi is completed.
- Operation at Hala'ovave was put on hold at 6:00am in order to open public road for ease of movement and will commence at 12:00pm
- TFES will verify the water pumping operation will continue to Ma'ufanga and Popua.



4.2 Clearing of Roads

- The Ministry of Infrastructure responded by clearing public roads that were blocked by fallen trees at the Hala Teputepuitemaka at 'Alaki Pelehake and By-Pass Road
- Continue monitoring of inundated roads; cones and signanges are still located in some areas to alert public.
